

Why are children's mental and behavioral health services important for Nevada?

- Nevada was ranked the worst state in providing access to behavioral health care for its youth in 2016. ^a
- Over I in 4 U.S. youth will witness or experience a traumatic event before age 4. b
- I in 5 youth ages 13-18 live with a mental health condition.
- Only I in I4 youth who need services receive appropriate help. ^c
- Half of lifetime mental health disorders start by age 14.^c
- In 2015, more than 2 in 5 Clark County middle school students had thoughts of suicide.

Whether rich or poor, insured or uninsured, families of children with serious behavioral health disorders struggle to find appropriate services.

Now is the time for parents, policymakers, & professionals to come together to increase access to quality care for all.

Strategic Goals to Achieve by 2020

CCCMHC developed a Strategic Plan to guide the community in providing mental health services to children with emotional disturbance and their families. Below are the top six goals from this plan to help Clark County youth.

- Children with serious emotional disturbance & their families will thrive at home, at school, & in the community with intensive supports and services.
- Children with behavioral health needs and their families will access a comprehensive array of effective services when and where needed.
- Families seeking assistance will find an organized pathway to information, referral, assessment & crisis intervention coordinated across agencies & providers.
- 4. The system will be managed at the local level through a partnership of families, providers & stakeholders committed to community-based, family-driven, & culturally competent services.
- 5. County-wide programs will be available to facilitate all children's healthy social & emotional development, identify behavioral health issues as early as possible, & assist all families in caring for their children.
- Heightened public awareness of children's behavioral health needs will reduce stigma, empower families to seek early assistance and mobilize community support for system enhancements.

The Clark County Children's Mental Health Consortium has been a part of the community since 2001. Created by the passage of Assembly Bill I of the 2001 Special Session of the Nevada Legislature, it brings professionals & parents together from a variety of disciplines & organizations to focus on bettering the services & resources for children's mental health in Clark County, NV.
